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The Harborage

Building Bridges and Making Enemies

The second of a two-part series about the bridges over St. Alban's Bay, Excelsion

Both the Village of Excelsior and Excelsior Township residents were long desirous of a safe way across Saint Alban's Bay after the area was settled. As early as 1892, they approached the Minneapolis and Saint Louis Railway about the possibility of placing a pedestrian walkway on the Railway's bridge, but the proposal was rejected by the Railway.



The Solberg Point draw bridge was reconstructed during the winter of 1893-1894. Men posed for a photograph on the newly completed bridge, April 1894.

Finally, a wagon and foot bridge were built just east of the Railway's swivel drawbridge

during the winter of 1896-1897. The new bridge and approaches were 399 feet long with a drawbridge 54 feet in width. As with earlier parties interested in St. Alban's Bay, financial bickering among Hennepin County, the Village of Excelsior, and Excelsior Township quickly followed. The County Engineer refused to release the \$2,500 pledged by the County Commissioners because of a law prohibiting the County from expending more than \$300 to any single municipality. Eventually, the Minnesota Legislature passed a special law in 1899 to allow this payment and Captain John R. Johnson was paid.

The bridge quickly began to deteriorate, resulting in another dispute, now between the Village and Township regarding expenses for repairs. A Hennepin County District Court judgment dated August 17, 1903, declared that the boundary between the two was the middle of the draw bridge and that the Village was responsible for repairs on the south side and the Township, for the north side. The original bridge was in such poor condition that it actually collapsed as reported in the Minneapolis Journal, October 19, 1904.

The wagon bridge across the neck of St. Albans bay, Minnetonka, is a wreck. Last evening, a heavy car, hauled by four harses [sic], was crossing the bridge, when the driver felt the drawbridge section begin to sink. He whipped up his horses and succeeded in crossing safely. C. H. Smith, of light rig, also

After three years of careful study, discussion and consider- We encourage members to attend one of the members' ation, the Boards of Directors of the Excelsior-Lake Minnetonka Historical Society, Museum of Lake Minnetonka (Steamboat Minnehaha), Wayzata Historical Society and Westonka Historical Society have voted unanimously to approve a Plan of Consolidation between our four organizations.

Current members of each organization have been sent a Special Membership Meeting Notice and will vote on a Plan of Consolidation pursuant to MN Statute 317A.613, Subd. 2, by the end of May.

The Board of Directors feel that this path will address the sustainability challenges our volunteer organization has faced over the years and will allow us to remain diligent stewards of our history as we continue to collect, preserve and share the history of **Deephaven**, **Excelsior**, Greenwood, Shorewood and Tonka Bay together with Lake Minnetonka's history as a whole.

Consolidation Information Sessions listed below to learn more about the proposed consolidation and have their questions answered. At these presentations, the Joint Committee of the four organizations will share the background of the proposed consolidation and explain how the consolidated organization will operate and be governed. ELMHS members will then vote on the Plan of Consolidation on May 23 (see below).

This is a very exciting time for Lake Minnetonka History and we're looking forward to sharing what the future holds for all of us.

succeeded in getting over. The draw a few moments later sank into the stream. The bridge is very old and has been considered unsafe for some time in spite of the fact that the village of Excelsior last spring spent money in repairs.

In January 1903, the Minneapolis and Saint Louis Railway had conducted surveys in preparation to replace the wooden railway bridge at Solberg Point. *The Minnetonka Record*, October 26, 1904, reported,

The material has arrived for the new railway bridge across the neck of St. Albans bay, and the work of driving piles has already begun. The new bridge will be an up-to-date steel drawbridge, with a draw wide enough to allow the passage of the largest steamers on the lake. It will be shorter than the old bridge, as a portion of the lake will be filled.

As the ice thawed in the spring of 1905 though, a safe wagon and foot bridge was needed while the new bridge was constructed. In March, Hennepin County paid Captain Johnson \$200 to place the current bridge in a safe condition and five dollars a month for its upkeep. He must not have though because by December 11, 1905, the Hennepin County Commissioners ordered that Village of Excelsior citizens be notified that the bridge was unsafe for travel. By March of the next year, the contract for building a new drawbridge was let to



Minneapolis Steel & Machinery Company for \$9,985. The Village and Township had an agreement with Hennepin County that they would secure a sixty-six foot wide roadway to the bridge approaches and give title to that land to the County. In return, the County agreed to build and maintain the new bridge. By July 1906, the bridge was likely nearing completion since the Excelsior Village Council started drafting an ordinance against fishing from the bridge.

Maps suggest that a great amount of fill was deposited into the lake when this new bridge at St. Albans Bay was constructed. A 1918 Minneapolis & St. Paul Suburban Railroad right-of-way map shows

how the fill was deposited from the southern shore of Saint Alban's Bay towards the new wagon bridge. This drawing shows water between the County Road and the Minneapolis and Saint Louis Railway. The Village of Excelsior was responsible for filling this area. Minutes from their June 3, 1930 meeting read, "Motion made + carried that we allow dumping of ashes and

allowable material between the M + St L R.R tracks and the county road leading to the draw bridge." After 3 years of residents dumping their garbage though, city Council minutes referred to a rat infestation "in the village dump near drawbridge." Soon after, the Council requested that the Civil Works Administration properly, "fill along the county road from 2nd St to the drawbridge."

A February 1939, the State of Minnesota
Department of Highways planned for another new bridge—the one used today. Plans show the placement of new bridge abutments up to which even more fill was to be placed. This bridge was completed in 1941 in a landscape significantly changed by the fill added to the shoreline. It has kept a peaceful bridge between all the area's "progress builders" since then.




