

Ice Boating on Lake Minnetonka

If the conditions are right on Lake Minnetonka you might see what looks like sailboats flying across the ice at speeds you didn't know could be achieved by anything without a motor — that's ice boating or as some call it, ice yachting. One of the thrills that has always been associated with summers on Lake Minnetonka is racing with the power of the wind. So it's no surprise that ice boating followed suit in the winter months.

The sport of ice boating in America was born on the Hudson River in 1869 when John A. Roosevelt (uncle of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt) built "Icicle." "Icicle" was nearly 67' long with about 1000 square

1880s that ice boating came to Lake Minnetonka. History tells us that the first ice boat race on Lake Minnetonka was held in 1886. Ten-year old Ward Burton sailed "Blizzard," a boat owned by T. B. Janney, in that race. When he didn't win he was quoted as saying: "Will Ray, a farmer at Point Lookout, licked the tar out of us."


On September 23,1899 the Minnetonka Ice Yacht Club (MIYC) was incorporated. Theodore Wetmore of New York, "Father of Ice Yachting in the West" and owner of "North Star," the fastest ice boat on Lake Minnetonka, became the club's first commodore. The MIYC, also known as Wetmore House, was located on Tahtu (Bug) Island in St. Louis Bay. A racing club that started as a group of 15 avid yachtsmen grew rapidly. Within 2 years MIYC had 167 members and 17 boats.

Ice Boating on Lake Minnetonka Continued...

Many of these magnificent ice boats were owned by wealthy sportsmen who demanded the very finest in fittings and riggings. The boats themselves were of fairly simple construction: body/cockpit, rudder and sail. A running start or a shove by the crew was required to get the boat moving. Depending on size, one or more crew members

crouched in the cockpit as the boat skated across the ice. These boats achieved speeds rivaling the fastest trains. The larger the sail area, the faster the boat

Ice boating on the Hudson River ended in 1902 when the decision was made to keep the river open year-round for commercial shipping. That's when Mr. Norman Wright, who represented several of the Hudson River owners, sold several of these magnificent boats to Lake

February 18, 1885 "Northern Light" had won the Ice Yacht Grand Challenge Pennant on the Hudson River. According to Burton, "Northern Light" was clocked at a speed of 118.2 miles per hour. In her book *Minnetonka Yacht Club Centennial 1882-1982*, author Virginia Brainard Kunz wrote that Burton made his record-breaking run from Gideon's Bay to Wayzata in "Zero." On that afternoon in 1902 Burton and his crew, Harry Bowdoin and A.M. Robertson, made the approximately five mile journey in 3 minutes and 45 seconds.

Unfortunately, the MIYC was destroyed by fire on January 14, 1904 and never rebuilt. "Northern Light, the most famous ice boat on Lake Minnetonka, saw its last season one year after being sold in 1959. And, today's ice boats are no longer the gigantic boats of the past. But, a community of avid ice boaters still exists on Lake Minnetonka and we are still able to marvel at the incredible rates of speed modern ice boats achieve. Those of us who have had the pleasure of taking a spin around Lake Minnetonka aboard an ice boat know it's a thrill like none other. In 2012 a representative of the Minnesota Ice Sailing Association was asked if the sport is safe — "Nope, not a chance."





Lake Minnetonka's First Steamboats

Steam navigation of Lake Minnetonka began as early as the 1860's when *The Governor Ramsey* was built for the Rev. Charles Galpin to carry mail from Excelsior across Lake Minnetonka and down the then navigable Minnehaha creek to Minnetonka Mills. The early steamboats had names like *Mercury, May Queen, Rambler, Seventy-Six,* and *Lotus.* In 1881, the 160 foot long *City of St Louis* was launched as the first inland vessel in the United States with electric lighting. It was quickly eclipsed the following year by the 300 foot *Belle of Minnetonka*, the largest vessel ever to navigate the lake.

Historian Aaron Isaacs of the Minnesota Streetcar Museum will tell the story of how early steamboats navigated the lake long before the Twin City Rapid Transit Co launched its iconic streetcar boats like the "Minnehaha." He is co-author of the book "Twin Cities by Trolley."
